## DCR Commissioner Attends Annual Meeting

Newly appointed DCR Commissioner Edward Lambert spoke at the April 13th Annual Meeting of the Friends of Lynn and Nahant Beach. Friends President Bob Tucker told the Commissioner of the excellent relationship and partnership the Friends has with the DCR and praised the local DCR staff for doing an outstanding job for Lynn and Nahant beaches.

Commissioner Lambert acknowledged the special partnership we have with the DCR and pledged to continue the excellent working relationship between the Friends and DCR. The Commissioner said that DCR has faced significant budget reductions since 2009, losing over 170 positions resulting in a 25% reduction in funding. This year, funding is being reduced again which will result in further staff reductions.

Despite the funding reductions, Commissioner Lambert said that Lynn and Nahant beaches full time staff will remain the same but part time summer help may be reduced. He announced that a three year landscaping contract will be approved for our beach reservation and he committed to a full fledged algae removal program. Staffing and equipment will be properly assigned to continue removing the algae. DCR will continue to provide assistance for the Friends Summer Concert Series.

Needless to say, we are very pleased with Commissioner Lambert's decision to continue full staffing for Lynn and Nahant beaches and to go forward with the landscaping services and algae removal program. We look forward to working with Commissioner Lambert and his staff in maintaining the preservation of our beaches in these difficult economic times.

Also, at the Annual Meeting, elections were held for three seats on the Board of Directors. Long-time member and Vice President Jerry Caron did not run for re-election; Michael Celona was elected to take his place- big shoes to fill! Perry Weschler was re-elected to the board and Tiffany Bevis was elected to fill a vacancy.

## Summer Concert Series Begins July 3rd

We have received two large grants that will help cover the costs of the concerts. Lynn Arts awarded us \$2,000 as part of the Massachusetts Cultural Council funding. Save The Harbor/Save The Bay awarded us \$3,500 as part of their support for area ocean groups and in recognition of the money we raised during the Cupid Swim on April 1st. The Friends were one of three groups to receive this amount, which was the highest given.

## Kids Day July 30th

The Second Annual Kids Day will be held on Saturday, July 30th from 12-3PM. Due to the large turnout last year, we are adding extra activities and the time for them. The entire schedule is on page 4, but activities from 12-2PM will include:

Native American Lore

Dear Friends,

For a change of pace, this issue's Nature Notes is dedicated to the *Massachusetts* Indians, the original inhabitants of the Lynn/Nahant Beach area. In early Colonial Times, c. 1620, an estimated 800 *Massachusetts* Indians lived in seasonal coastal settlements in greater Boston. The *Massachusetts*, like the neighboring *Wampanoag* and *Pawtuckets*, were a sub-group of the Algonquian family of peoples. Their leader was the Great Sachem *Nanepashemet* (the "New Moon"). His wife was known as the "Squaw Sachem"; her Indian name was not recorded.

The region between Boston (*Shawmut*) and Salem (*Naumkeag*) was called *Saugus* ("extended"). This name may have referred to the great salt marshes that once extended between Boston and Salem. *Saugus* was in the charge of *Nanepashemet*'s son *Montowompate* (called "Sagamore James" by the colonists). *Montowompate* was thought to occupy a semi-permanent settlement on the hill near the present day intersection of Sachem, Newhall and Sagamore streets in Lynn. *Montowompate*'s son *Poquamen* was the Sachem of the coastal strip between Nahant and Swampscott. The colonists called him "Black Will" or "Duke Williams".

*Poquamen*, like all the *Massachusetts*, moved with the seasons. Spring found them on the coast gathering shellfish and fishing. Summer was spent sewing fields of corn and squash. Fall was dedicated to the harvest. Winter saw them move to inland camps for deer and turkey hunting. *Poquamen*'s spring settlement was located on the present day site of Anthony's Pier 4 Restaurant in Swampscott. This spot is still known as "Black Will's Cliff". The word Swampscott itself is derived from the Algonquian phrase *M'squompskut* meaning "of the red rock". *Poquamen* sold the islands of Nahant to colonist Thomas Dexter for a suit of clothes. The name Nahant is thought to derive from the Algonquian word *nahateau* meaning "twin" and describes Big and Little Nahant islands. Nahant was highly coveted pastureland; a fence could be built across the causeway (then a sandbar) to prevent wolves from attacking grazing livestock.

Sadly, the arrival of the colonists accelerated the extinction of the *Massachusetts* and their way of life. The *Massachusetts* were already experiencing a decline brought on by epidemics and protracted warfare with competing tribes. The colonists displaced the *Massachusetts* from their seasonal cycles and favored hunting grounds. Introduced diseases like small pox ravaged colonists and natives alike, but the *Massachusetts* populations were never able to recover. By 1776, the *Massachusetts* had largely disappeared.

*Nanepashemet* was killed during an attack by the Maine based *Tarratine* tribe on his stronghold in present day Medford. Squaw Sachem ably ruled in his stead. *Poquamen* also came to a bad end. Seized and imprisoned by colonists while on a fishing expedition in Maine, he was tried and executed for crimes committed by other Indians. *Montowompate* succumbed to small pox in 1633. Although the *Massachusetts* are no more, their spirit lives on in the love present day residents have of the sea and shore and by the place names they bequeathed on their sacred lands.

**Note:** Be sure to visit the "Sharks and Seashells" table at the Kid's Concert on July 30, 2011. Youngsters can handle local marine animals and partake in arts and crafts activities. We look forward to seeing you then!
